


# Community Insight

#### Dear All,

Welcome to another Community Insight.

This newsletter contains information about some of our activity across the Island during what is a particularly active time for Island Roads. While delivering a resurfacing programme this autumn, we are also gearing up for the winter maintenance season. Already we have experienced some heavy rainfall and this newsletter contains advice on what landowners can do to help us keep the highways free of rainwater run-off.

We are also delivering a major scheme to lay a new deck in Yarmouth Bridge, while our borehole work at Leeson Road in Ventnor is also well underway.

All of us at Island Roads appreciate this is a very busy time on the network. This is partly because of the way that, under the PFI, we keep the main roads as free of disruption as possible during the high summer season. This is to minimise impact on the holiday economy but it does mean that there are fewer weeks available in the year to undertake the required improvement work.

We do understand the frustrations this intense work causes to the travelling public but — for safety reasons — we respectfully ask road users to observe traffic restrictions such as road closures. We have recently purchased CCTV cameras to help enforce these road closures and to help us take action against those who endanger themselves, our staff, and other road users by ignoring road signs.

# From Tower Bridge to Yarmouth Bridge

Work to replace the deck of Yarmouth Bridge using Technology the same as that used on London's Tower Bridge is progressing well.

The eight-week project, which involves the closure of the structure to motor vehicles, will also see the bridge's footways also replaced.

### **Autumn Resurfacing Work**

A programme of resurfacing work is being delivered this autumn.

Around a dozen sites across the Island including both main and rural roads are included in the work. Among the most busy routes to be upgrades at a section of the main Newport to Cowes Road at Northwood and Atherley Road in Shanklin.

### **Help Us Prevent Highway Flooding**

Island Roads has stepped up its activities to help reduce highway flooding this year.

This work includes additional road sweeping which aims to prevent autumn leaf fall entering the drainage system.

We are also reminding landowners of the steps they are legally required to do to help stop rainwater entering the highway. Water running off from fields - which is typically brown in colour - can quickly overwhelm highways drainage systems so the assistance of landowners is really important.

# Work Continuing to Re-Open Leeson Road

A major project to sink three boreholes - some of the deepest over drilled on the Island - is ongoing.

The purpose of the boreholes, which are as deep as 130 metres, is twofold: to retrieve ground samples which help us further understand the local geography and to install further equipment so we can monitor accurately any ongoing ground movement.

# **Keeping Worksites and Staff Safe**

Island Roads is using new CCTV cameras to help ensure road closures are observed and on-site staff and pedestrians are not put at risk by motorists who ignore signs.

The cameras will also be used to record evidence of staff being subject to verbal and physical abuse, following an increase in such incidents.

#### **Electric Cars Join the Fleet**

Twelve electric vehicles have joined the Island Roads fleet as part of the company's commitment to reducing its carbon footprint.

Island Roads began using electric vehicles in 2013 and has since been upgrading its fleet continually as vehicles need replacing. The company now has 21 electric vans, which are used by highways inspectors and district stewards to carry out their work around the Island.

The latest arrivals to the fleet are five Renault Ekangoos and seven Peugeot Partners, replacing 12 diesel vans. Island Roads has charging infrastructure at its base at St Christopher House in Newport and also its depot at Stag Lane. Staff can also make use of the Island's network of public charging points across the Island if needed.
